

# Critical wildlife corridors will be cut off by border wall construction.

In February 2019, the Department of Homeland Security formally requested the Department of Defense to fund and replace existing structures along the U.S.-Mexico border with pedestrian walls. Here's where that will happen and the wildlife impacted.

## Yuma Sector

*Species at risk: Sonoran pronghorn*  
3 project areas • Replacing ~36 miles of existing vehicle barrier and ~6 miles of pedestrian wall with new pedestrian wall



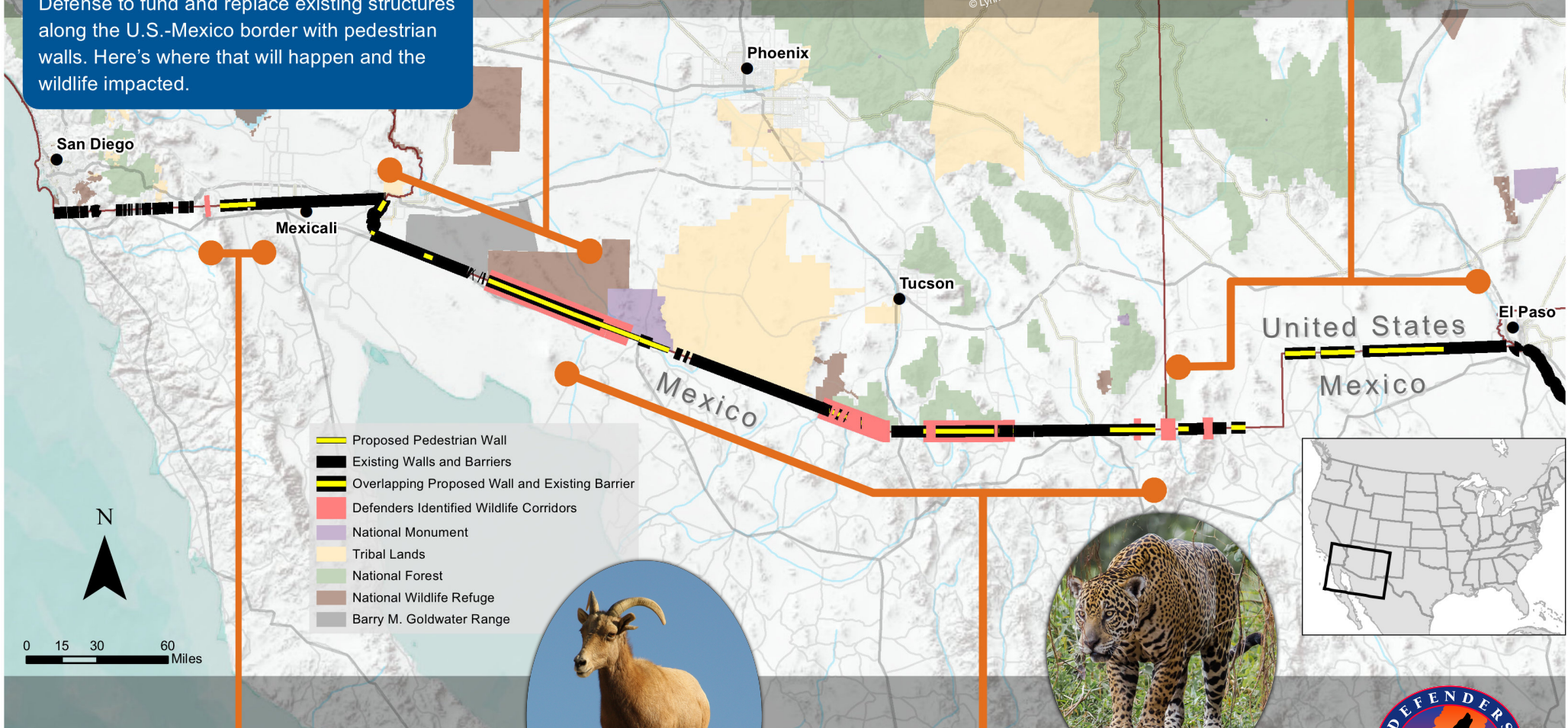
