

Green Jobs For Refuges

Creating Jobs in Hawaii by Investing in National Wildlife Refuges

The Cooperative Alliance For Refuge Enhancement (CARE) and its combined 14 million members and supporters urge Congress to include \$1 billion for nearly 20,000 new green jobs on national wildlife refuges nationwide in the 2009 economic recovery package.

A \$1 billion investment nationally would support over \$33 million in projects for Hawaii and create more than 794 new jobs on 12 National Wildlife Refuges in the state.


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Economic Value of Stimulus to Local Hawaiian Communities

ational Wildlife Refuges offer significant economic benefits by attracting 40 million visitors annually, who spend more than \$1.7 billion each year, resulting in employment for more than 27,000 Americans. Refuges are economic engines in local economies, returning at least \$4 of economic activity for every \$1 appropriated by Congress and in many cases the return is much, much higher.

An investment of \$33 million to build green facilities, install renewable energy technology, and restore thousands of acres of wildlife habitat leverages a much larger total economic return for citizens, communities, and the State. Based on estimates from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, this investment will generate:

Total Economic Output: \$97.5 million Local and State revenue: \$49.1 million
